We offer three grants: Small, Large and Seed. Our Small Grant is for projects with a total cost of less than \$20,000. If your project cost is more, you need to apply for a Large Grant. Northern Spotted Owl update - Chick D has come a long way

Remember the picture below? Before becoming the focus of the owl webcam streamed live on our website, "Chick D" spent the first 15 days of his or her life in intensive care at the Northern Spotted Owl Breeding Program's facility this spring. More than 7,500 square metres of salmon habitat created

The Fraser Valley Watersheds Coalition, along its partners, has been very busy and productive in the Lower Stave River watershed. With FWCP funding, the latest work phase has resulted in 7,866 m² (a little under the size of a Canadian Football field) of newly-created instream salmon habitat. In addition, more than 16,000 native plants were used to restore 2,768 m² of riparian habitat. No doubt, the fish will benefit from their new and improved "digs" - literally since an excavator using a "knuckle bucket" was used to open channels without impacting archaeological values.
