Fisher behaviour shown in rare video footage

Female Fishers require tree cavities for reproduction, as they provide a secure environment for kits by regulating temperature extremes and limiting predator access. Sometimes, predation can come from male Fishers, and rare video footage highlights the efforts some males will make to ensure that progeny from other males do not survive. See the video
