Presentation Summary:

Working to establish Dasiqox Nexwagwez?an, a Tsilhqot'in IPCA initiative, is a journey full of twists and turns. A new term for very old relationships, Dasiqox Nexwagwez?an has its roots in the waters and lands that are cared for by Xeni Gwet'in and Yunesit'in. Yet the work of establishing an IPCA is a complex and challenging process that plays out amidst the noise and turmoil of contemporary politics and economics. How do we translate Indigenous ways of life and governance – not only in language but in stewardship practices, local economies, jurisdictional relationships – without undermining their fundamental nature? The story of Dasiqox Nexwagwez?an is one of many contemporary tales of Indigenous resurgence through IPCA initiatives, and the hard work happening behind the scenes to realize the workable, desired futures that Indigenous communities choose for themselves.

Jonaki Bhattacharyya is an ethnoecologist who does applied biocultural research, specializing in Indigenous-led stewardship and planning. An independent consultant and researcher, Jonaki works primarily for community-based initiatives, providing technical support and facilitation services to Indigenous nations and their partners. She earned her PhD (University of Waterloo, 2012) by learning from Tsilhqot'in – listening, walking and camping on the land. Jonaki draws on diverse interdisciplinary and cultural experiences in her work, and has provided technical services to support multiple Indigenous communities and First Nations throughout Canada. She is part of the core team working to establish Dasiqox Nexwagwez?an (Tsilhqot'in Protected Area) since 2014, a recipient of the Wilburforce Fellowship in Conservation Science (2015) and serves on the board of West Coast Environmental Law.
