Introduction to FWCP

The FWCP is a partnership between BC Hydro, the Province of B.C., Fisheries and Oceans Canada, First Nations, and public interest holders to conserve and enhance fish and wildlife in watersheds impacted by BC Hydro dams.

BC Hydro fulfills water licence and voluntary commitments through the FWCP. The FWCP is funded by BC Hydro.

FWCP Mission


The Fish & Wildlife Compensation Program compensates for fish and wildlife in watersheds impacted by existing BC Hydro dams.





Strengthening First Nations engagement

- Strengthened engagement of First Nations is a priority for our Peace and Columbia Region boards and a consideration during the review and evaluation of all grant applications.
- Peace Region First Nations Working Group established in 2012 through a Memorandum of Understanding signed by nine First Nations: Doig River, Kwadacha, McLeod Lake, Nak'azdli Whut'en, Prophet River, Saulteau, Treaty 8 Tribal Association, Tsay Keh Dene, and West Moberly First Nations.
- Columbia Region First Nations Working Group established in 2022 with three Nations: Okanagan Nation Alliance, Secwepemc Nation, and Ktunaxa Nation.
- **First Nations Working Groups** ensure First Nations' considerations and input are included in all aspects of planning and delivery of the FWCP, including opportunities for First Nations involvement in projects.



Why a notice of intent (NOI)?

- The NOI process helps grant seekers identify contacts and connect with First Nations interested in being part of your proposed project.
- It is the basis for identifying opportunities for First Nations' perspectives and involvement in your project.



Answer 'yes' if one of these groups is the applicant and they would receive the funding.







Question 5: Any project supporters?

A supporter is an organization that provides in-kind, cash or other support for your

project.



Question 6: Project location



Click on one of the sub-regions or click basin-wide if the project may overlap more than one sub-region.


Provide a latitude and longitude for the centre of the proposed project site/location

and

Draw a polygon to show the project area(s) within the subregion or basin.



Question 7: What type of project year is this application for?



Note: If your project is in 2+ year with no project area change, you will need to indicate which First Nations were interested or participated in your project in the previous year.



What happens after I submit my NOI?

The week of September 29, you will receive correspondence from the region manager that includes:

- 1. Contact info for the First Nations interested in your project
- 2. Other relevant guidance to support your grant application



Fall 2025: Notice of intent timeline

Deadline to submit notice of intent September 9, 2025 (4 p.m. PT / 5 p.m. MT) First Nations Working Group members review notice(s) of intent Grant applicants notified by FWCP Week of September 29, 2025 Early engagement between grant applicants and Nations Start engaging with the Nations early! **Grant applications due**

Engaging First Nations: type of relationship

Four potential types of relationships with First Nations:

- **Support in principle**. A First Nation provides a letter of support for the project but is <u>not</u> directly involved in the project.
- **Financial or in-kind support**. A First Nation contributes funds or in-kind services that increase the total value of the project.
- Working relationship. Budgeted involvement in the project (e.g., First Nations technicians employed through the project).
- **Project development support**. A First Nation contributes to project development (e.g., Indigenous knowledge and values incorporated into scope) and implementation (e.g., First Nations have budgeted involvement in the project).

Grant intake

Our annual grant intake is now open. Start by reading our <u>regional guidance documents</u>. Review our <u>regional action plans</u> and develop a project idea that aligns with the priority actions.

In our Columbia and Peace regions, all grant applicants must submit a <u>notice of intent</u> by Tuesday, September 9, 2025. This short project description is your first step and it's part of how we are strengthening engagement of First Nations in the projects we fund.

Coastal Region grant applicants are not required to submit a notice of intent.

Key dates for grant intake

- . Thursday, August 7: Notice of intent information session
- . Tuesday, September 9: Mandatory notice of intent due in our Columbia and Peace regions

- · Monday, November 3: Annual grant applications due

- Our Columbia Region board will be accepting only grant applications for priority 1 actions in our action plans.
- Our Peace Region board will not be accepting new applications for Arctic grayling at this time.
- We encourage all grant applicants to include additional funding partners in their grant application that can help leverage FWCP funding for greater positive ecological effect.

Apply for an annual grant now

Our annual grant intake is now open. Get started by reading our regional guidance documents. In our Peace Region, we're encouraging grant applications that include other funding sources. We also have guidance about projects for Arctic gray/ling, wetlands and riparian areas, research and information acquisition projects, and provincial government applicants.

All grant applicants in our Peace Region must submit a notice of intent (NOI) by Tuesday, September 9, 4 p.m. PT / 5 p.m. MT, 2025. Submitting this short project description is the first step in your grant application.
