We're accepting grant applications now for fish and wildlife projects starting in 2017. We offer seed grants to help get project ideas started, small grants for projects under \$20,000, and large grants for projects valued at more than \$20,000. We fund projects that align with our [FWCP Coastal Action Plans](#) and priorities. [Apply online](#) and make sure you submit your completed grant application by Friday 5:00 p.m. Pacific Time, October 28, 2016.

First "Skyline" Gravel Drops, Elk Falls

The first loads of spawning gravel released from a new bucket and cable system at Elk Falls Canyon on Campbell River went off without a hitch this summer. The new "skyline" system over the steep canyon replaces the previous method of making the gravel drops from a helicopter, and helps improve safety while reducing cost. [Read more](#)
