The deadline to submit <u>your online grant</u> application is 5:00 p.m., Friday, October 28, 2016. We offer seed grants to help get project ideas started, small grants for projects under \$20,000, and large grants for projects valued at more than \$20,000. Projects must align with our <u>Coastal Action Plans</u>. And we've made it easier for you: you can now copy from your last grant application. Simply request to copy your last grant application in the "Notes/Questions" tab once you have started an application. For specific details, refer to the "Help" tab in the application.




Volunteers Wanted: Salmon River Conservation Area

We're starting discussions now with technical experts, First Nations, stakeholders and community members in our Coastal Region in order to update our 2011 Watershed Action Plans. The Action Plans guide our funding decisions and help determine what conservation and enhancement projects we support. This fall we're hosting half-day, in-person discussions on Vancouver Island in



November 2016. And we're planning discussions for smaller, Coastal watersheds too. Dates and times are being finalized. We'll renew our remaining Action Plans for Lower Mainland and Interior watersheds in spring 2017. Read more
