Grants available for fish & wildlife projects, apply now

We're now accepting grant applications for projects that will align with our updated [Action Plans](#) and will be implemented within the [14 watersheds](#) in our Coastal Region. Grant applications are due Friday, October 26, 2018, 5 p.m.



Steps to submitting your grant application

If you are interested in submitting a grant application, then:

1. read our [2018 Grant Application Info Kit](#);
2. review the Priority Actions in the watershed Action Plan of interest to you;
3. develop a project idea to fulfill a Priority Action in any Action Plan(s);
4. login to our [online grant management system](#); and
5. submit your completed online grant application by the deadline.
