Priorities for 2019-2020 projects include: stream habitat restoration and enhancement activities; riparian and wetland restoration and conservation activities; and work being implemented in the North Columbia.

A new maternity roost for Townsend's Big-eared Bats has been constructed on the Earl Conservation property near Newgate, on Koocanusa Reservoir's west side. The project, led by the Province of B.C., provides an alternative roost site to an old barn nearby that may soon no longer provide suitable habitat for the bats. The new roost is built, but how does one go about attracting the bats to use it? Read more.
