Columbia Region approves 43 projects for 2020-2021

Our Columbia Region board approved approximately \$5.5 million for 43 projects for 2020-2021. The 11 fish and 32 wildlife projects will be delivered by stewardship groups, agencies, Indigenous Nations, consultants, and others. Together the projects will restore spawning and riparian areas, improve grassland and upland habitats, assess and monitor populations, conserve wildlife corridors, restore wetlands, and secure lands for conservation. The projects will benefit wolverines, bighorn sheep, bull trout, kokanee, sturgeon, birds, amphibians, bats, and more. Read our 2020-2021 [Columbia Region project list](#). 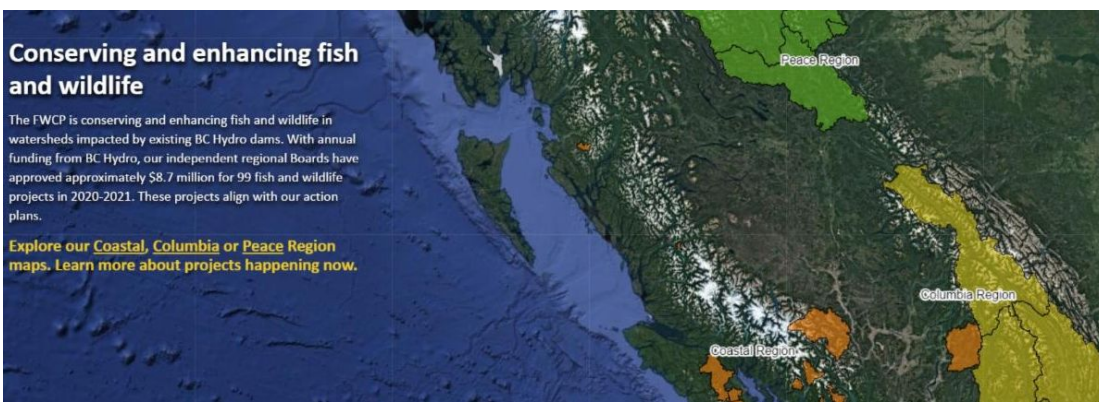
\$8.7 million approved for 99 projects in our three regions

Our three regional boards approved funding for 99 projects this year to conserve and enhance fish and wildlife in watersheds impacted by BC Hydro dams. The FWCP is conserving and enhancing fish and wildlife in watersheds impacted by existing BC Hydro dams. With annual funding from BC Hydro, our independent regional Boards have approved approximately \$8.7 million for 99 fish and wildlife projects in 2020-2021. These projects align with our action plans.

Reptiles at risk: 17 snake hibernacula discovered

Over a six-year period from 2013 to 2018, a total of 38 North American racer snakes and two northern rubber boas were captured and radio-tracked. This resulted in the discovery of 16 racer and one rubber boa hibernacula. [The project](#), carried out by wildlife biologists Jakob Dulisse and Marlene Machmer, helped inform local land managers to conserve important habitat, and increase awareness about these and other at-risk reptile populations south of Trail.
