Get ready: Grant intake opens August 11



First local Motus stations installed to track birds and bats



Data collection about birds and bats in the Peace Region is about to get a boost from seven new receiver stations installed in 2021 to detect birds and bats affixed with digitally-encoded radio transmitters.

Better understanding of migration and habitat use could help inform future conservation actions planning for birds. And better understanding of bat movement and bat ecology is critical with the threat of the fatal white-nose syndrome. Read more PEA-F22-W-3435.
